Manager's Message

We certainly hope that you enjoy the Fall 2016 edition of the Chartiers Township Newsletter, and find the information contained in it helpful. Please take the opportunity to try one of our many classes or programs at the Community Center this fall. As we prepare for the fall and winter months, we have included some useful information to assist you in dealing with Township operations this winter. In the coming months, the Township will be working on the 2017 Budget. As part of that process, the Township will have to adjust the Township tax rate to account for the Washington County Reassessment. The Township will reduce the current 9 mill tax rate that has remained steady for 22 years to accommodate the 100% valuation and new assessed values that the County has established. As you may know, the Township's real estate revenue stream cannot prosper from the reassessment and the "anti-windfall" provision in the reassessment law means that the Township must lower the tax rate to ensure that the Township does not collect more than 110% of the prior year's real estate tax revenue. We understand that the Township's overall tax base may change as a

result of assessment appeals, but we will do our best to calculate the new tax rate based on all the information available and ensure that we fall within anti-windfall cap. Once the new tax rate is established we will make the Township's millage calculation available on the Township website so you can see how we came up with the new rate along with worksheets you can use to figure out the amount you can expect to pay in



Township taxes in 2017. Please keep in mind, while the overall taxes the Township receives will be neutral, individuals taxes may fluctuate based on the relationship of your old assessed value to your new assessed value. We understand that the new assessments, new system and tax rates is a change for everyone and we will try to make things as clear as possible and provide you with the information you need to understand paying your taxes with the new assessed values.

A Message From the Chief of Police

Summer is about to end and the leaves will be falling soon. School is in and the busses are rolling. A reminder that passing a school bus loading or unloading students is a violation and carries a steep fine. Officers will be monitoring school bus routes for not only this violation but also speeding and aggressive driving. I urge you to lock your vehicles and not to leave valuable items laying in plain sight. If for some reason you must leave these items in your car, lock them in your trunk.

Medicare Scams



Before and during open enrollment, which runs Oct. 15 through Dec. 7, identity thieves angle for your Social Security number posing as Medicare employees, claiming new cards are being issued, agency records need updating or they can help with plan enrollment. They solicit Medicare numbers

(which are the same as Social Security numbers) for "verification." Some seek payment, pretending you've got past-due medical bills. Don't believe them or caller ID. "Medicare will never call and ask for personal information, such as your Medicare number, over the phone,"

says an agency spokesman. Nor will Medicare email or visit your home unannounced to collect data it already has.

Cold-weather Capers

As the temperature chills, telephone scammers pose as utility company employees and threaten to shut off your service because of supposedly unpaid bills. Usually they request payment via hard-to-trace prepaid debit cards, but some ask for credit card numbers or even cash, offering to send someone to pick it up. If you really are overdue, most utilities will mail at least one, if not several, termination notices. Utility companies do not dispatch employees to your home for payments and rarely show up unannounced for service calls. Also beware — and get second opinions — when contractors you've hired at low-ball rates tell you they've discovered costly jobs that you'd better take care of right away before winter sets in, such as cleaning chimneys, HVAC ducts or furnaces.

Charity Cons

Superstorm Sandy hit in October — along with fake charities supposedly raising money for its victims. Last year, it was Ebola. And with the approaching holidays (and deadlines for year-end tax deductions), its prime time for heartstring tugging to get you to open your wallet. Besides the disaster du jour, scams that specifically target older donors often claim to help police and fire personnel, veterans, and sick or needy children. (Continued on page 8)

Chartiers Park Committee News

The Chartiers Township Park Committee has been busy over the past year meeting with representatives from Mackin Engineering Company to develop a




Parks and Recreation plan for Chartiers Township.

The plan was adopted in July and included recommendations regarding park development in the Township owned areas of Arnold Park, Allison Parkette, Ullom property and the Pine Lawn property that includes the Chartiers—Houston Community Library. It is available for review at the Township building or on the township website.

As a result of the plan, the park committee has identified three items to focus on getting completed in the first phase of development. They include a trail around Allison Parkette, rest rooms at Allison and development of a field at Arnold Park.

Snow Removal Tips

The Township Public Works Crew works hard to clean the 59 miles of Township roads during a snowfall. Snow routes are cleared as follows for emergency, safety and traffic reasons: school bus routes, hills and curves, collector and arterial



roads, residential streets and alleys are the last to be plowed.

Remember that the PennDOT is responsible for clearing the many miles of State roads in the Township. Keep in mind that is virtually impossible to keep plowed snow from being deposited in your driveway, but these hints may help minimize the amount of plowed

snow that ends up back in your driveway:

- Always shovel the snow to the RIGHT of your driveway. This
 will limit the amount of snow that is redirected into your
 driveway by passing plow trucks.
- Also clearing an area to the left of your driveway with further reduce the amount snow that ends up back in your driveway.
- On-street parking is prohibited in Chartiers Township. This is
 especially crucial during snow events to allow the roads to be
 cleared. In addition to your cars, please remove any moveable
 items from the road way prior to a snow event, such as trash
 and recycling cans, portable basketball hoops, backstops and
 soccer nets.
- No person shall deposit, or cause to be deposited, any snow or ice on or immediately next to a fire hydrant or on any sidewalk or roadway.

Parking on any Township road when you have off street parking is a violation. It you must park on the road, contact the Township for a free permit. Permits will be issued once it is determined that you have NO other OFF road parking available. Permits will not be given just as a matter of convenience. If you are going to have a gathering where you need to have some vehicles parked on the roadway, contact the CTPD to let us know at 724-745-8030 leave contact information as well as the date and times and have the vehicles parked in a manner not to impede traffic. If the officers see a problem, we will contact you to see what arrangements can be made so you can enjoy your event. We urge you to lock your vehicles and not to leave valuable items laying in plain sight.

Every person in charge or control of any building or lot of land fronting or abutting on a paved sidewalk, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee or otherwise, shall remove and clear away or cause to be removed or cleared away snow and/or ice a 30 inch path in width. Snow and ice shall be removed from sidewalks within 12 hours after the cessation of any fall of snow, sleet or freezing rain.

Please help keep sidewalks and roadways clear of snow and ice for the safety of the traveling and pedestrian public.







Unless you dialed, don't provide payment over the phone. If you didn't provide your email address to that organization, assume that email pitches are scams. Don't click on links, which could unleash dangerous malware programs into your computer. Ask door-to-door solicitors to leave some material with you so you can authenticate the organization before donating. Gauge a charity's credibility at give.org, charitynavigator.org or nasconet.org which regulates charities for the state.

Zoning Permits For Fences

A reminder that a Zoning Permit is required for residential fences. A Zoning Permit application can be found on-line at www.chartierstwp.com or at the Municipal Center during normal business hours. There are regulations as

Winter Pollution Prevention Practices

Here are some simple tips that you can do this winter to help prevent 'storm water pollution:'

- Shovel snow first to remove it from paved surfaces, like driveways and sidewalks, before it turns to ice to limit the need for snow melt and deicing products.
- Pile shoveled snow downslope of paved surfaces to help prevent icy and slippery conditions on pavement as snow melts and refreezes.
- Shovel snow onto lawn and vegetated areas where melting snow can soak into the ground.
- Limit the use of deicing chemicals and products on sidewalks and driveways since they can readily flow into

storm drains and streams as ice melts.

 Sweep up after the snow melts: Sweep and dispose of residual sand, grit, and litter to help prevent accumulation in streets and roadside ditches; clogged storm drains and culverts; and sediment pollution in streams.



- Keep gutters and drainage pathways clear and free of debris
 to prevent snowmelt from backing up and forming ice in
 places where you want runoff to flow freely.
- Direct, or route, snowmelt runoff into nearby gardens and vegetated areas before applying salt and deicing products
